Headteacher's Welcome

I would like to thank all parents for supporting us during the first half-term to implement all the restrictions and Government guidelines. I would also like to welcome all new parents whose child started with us in September. Usually we would have events and coffee mornings where I could welcome you in person but Covid-19 has sadly prevented these events from happening this year. I am hoping that at some point this academic year in the Spring Term we will be able to invite you in to meet us. At Marjory Kinnon we love to invite our families and community into the school and sincerely hope that this can happen again in the not too distant future.

This is a very tough time for us all, and as you will see on the news, cases are rising worryingly. Please can I ask you not to send your child in if they have any of the symptoms of Covid-19. If your child has a temperature or persistent cough we have to ask you to keep them home and get a test and we will need to see evidence of a negative result before they can return. I am hoping we can keep the school open until Christmas and we did manage to successfully keep the Primary open for most of last term. Unfortunately, having 3 positive cases in Secondary did mean we had no option other than to collapse most classes.

If this happens again throughout the winter season all the teachers will be available on Google Classrooms to continue teaching your child remotely. I know that the vast majority of you would expect the school to put safety first and follow Public Health England advice but I would ask the few parents that disagree and resort to blaming the staff to please understand that it is no-one's fault that this is happening, least of all teaching staff who just follow Government guidelines.

I have been asked by the London Borough of Hounslow to alert you all to the fact that Hounslow is a very high risk area and to please follow the Government guidelines at all times. Please wear face masks when dropping and collecting the children.

New Guidance: What to do if your child develops symptoms of COVID-19

If your child develops symptoms of COVID-19, they should remain at home for at least 10-days from the date when their symptoms appeared.

All other household members who remain well must stay at home and not leave the house for 14-days. The 14-day period starts from the day when the first person in the house became ill.

Household members should not go to work, school or public areas and exercise should be taken within the home.

Household members staying at home for 14-days will greatly reduce the overall amount of infection the household could pass on to others in the community.

If you are able, move any vulnerable individuals (such as the elderly and those with underlying health conditions) out of your home, to stay with friends or family for the duration of the home isolation period.

I am hoping that with your help and vigilance we will be able to prevent any further outbreaks and closures of class this half-term.

England enters a second lockdown on **Bonfire Night,** Thursday 5 November. With major displays cancelled and strict rules about gathering, what can we and can't we do?

All major fireworks displays are off in 2020, due to the coronavirus lockdown, but some people might still want to let off some rockets in their own back gardens. Here are some useful things to know.



Can I invite family or friends to a fireworks party in my back garden?

No. Under the lockdown restrictions, you must not meet inside or in your garden with family or friends, unless they are part of your household - that is, the people you live with or a support bubble.

Anyone caught in breach of lockdown rules on household mixing, even in a garden, could face a fine starting at £200. If you are found to be the organiser of a gathering of more than 30 people such as a firework display for family and friends - you could face a fine of £10,000.

If you are still planning to go ahead with a fireworks display, please follow the Firework Code:

- Only buy fireworks with a CE mark
- Don't drink alcohol if setting off fireworks
- Keep fireworks in a closed box
- Follow the instructions on each firework
- Light them at arm's length, using a taper
- Stand well back
- Never go near a firework that has been lit.
 Even if it hasn't gone off, it could still explode

- Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them
- Direct rockets away from spectators
- Always supervise children around fireworks
- Light sparklers one at a time and wear gloves
- Never give sparklers to a child under 5
- Keep pets indoors
- Don't let off fireworks after 11pm

The Heads of Departments shared with Governors the good work completed across the school.


Early Years & Primary

The Departments demonstrated examples of work towards the recovery curriculum including a classroom project with pupils looking at the Kandinsky Tree of Life. The children were able to express themselves through the artwork and show their individual personalities.





Classes did a project on emotions, learning to recognise, name and talk about emotions and used the Colour Monsters book as a guide.





Pupils designed their own 'Happiness Box' as introduced by Ms Meredith at the autumn whole school assembly. The children stuck images of preferred items onto them and filled them with their favourite classroom toys. The teaching staff created an area for pupils to display the boxes and to express their feelings.



Each child also created an 'All About Me' book with images of themselves and their families, which is kept with the 'Happiness Boxes' for pupil reflection.

Secondary

Students in US5 have based their GCSE project on Pablo Picasso. They have researched his work and explored the formal elements of his art. Using copies of Picasso's art, students have produced their own observational drawings using a variety of media. They have investigated the influence of African masks within Picasso's later cubist portraits and next steps will include the construction of 3D portraits.



Take One Picture is the National Gallery's scheme for schools with the focus on art to inspire cross-curricular work in classrooms. The challenge is to use images imaginatively in the classroom, both as a stimulus for artwork, and for work in more unexpected curriculum areas.





WHAT THE GOVERNING BODY DID THIS TERM


The term started with a virtual **Extraordinary Full Governing Body** meeting to consider the Risk Assessment for the reopening of the school. The document was written by the SLT in conjunction with the Local Authority Health & Safety Advisors. Governors recorded that the Risk Assessment catered for all possible eventualities and was a credit to the contributors. The document (which was published on the school's website) was fluid and would continue to be updated with ongoing Government guidance.

The Governors sent a letter to staff thanking them for their professionalism and for all their work to get the school ready for the autumn term under such challenging circumstances. The Governors asked staff to let them know what support the Governing Body could provide to help them do their jobs and for their wellbeing.

The Governing Body are holding a regular schedule of virtual meetings to ensure the safety of everyone at school during these unprecedented times and are in frequent touch to fully support the school leadership.

Although the **Teaching & Learning Committee** will not be conducting its usual in-person monitoring visits for the time being, the Governors are exploring ways to connect with the school and experience the great work the pupils are doing first-hand. This latest monitoring included noticeboard displays (as mentioned in this newsletter), virtual assemblies (snapshots below) and livestream observation of remote teaching via Google Classrooms.

Local Testing Locations

Hounslow hosts a Mobile Testing Unit every three days.

If you have symptoms of coronavirus, it is important that you get tested. You and your household should self-isolate and only leave the house to go and get tested.

If you are a Keyworker in Hounslow, you are entitled to be tested regularly, even if you do not have symptoms, to prevent asymptomatic spread of coronavirus.

Mobile Testing Units usually operate from **10.30am-3.30pm**. You need to book an appointment online before you go to the site.
